Golden Diggers Sydney book launch – You're invited!

Our new book, Golden Diggers, Hill End & Tambaroora District's contribution to World War 1 has been successfully launched in Hill End on Anzac Day and then in Bathurst a few weeks ago. To help celebrate National Family History Week in August it is now an appropriate time to launch it for all our Sydney Gathering Group members.



During our research we discovered that a few of the soldiers also had close association with the St George area in Sydney and so, with the help of Kogarah Town Square Library (Belgrave St, Kogarah) we will be holding the launch and author talk there on Saturday 1st August at 1pm.

We are pleased that Charles Davis, local St George amateur historian who is responsible for the WW1 Rockdale Enlistees website at https://sites.google.com/site/ww1rockdaleenlistees /home has agreed to help us launch the book. It

was on his website that we discovered a number of our "connections". Lorraine will be giving a presentation on how the book was researched and produced and Helen Wood will also be on hand to answer any questions you may have about the work.

Dr. Noeline Kyle's review of Golden Diggers:

If the discovery of gold was the raison d'etre for the picturesque historical village of Hill End then it will be the passion and hard work of family historian Helen Wood and retired librarian Lorraine Purcell that will ensure the lives of their Golden Diggers will be recorded as well as honoured in the future.

Almost 180 young men and women of Hill End, then with a tiny district population of 700, enlisted. Beginning with the names on the First World War Honour Board Helen Wood carried out meticulous research to include servicemen and women, who were born, grew up, went to school or lived in Hill End in the decades surrounding the war. One can only marvel at the dedication, persistence and attention to detail that has produced some wonderful portraits of the men and women who faced terrible times on the fields of France and who then often returned to complex and hard circumstances at home.

Anyone who has completed research on personnel from World War 1 will know the many frustrations of painting a fuller portrait of young men and women eager to make their contribution to the war effort. It is a credit to these two authors that on each page of *Golden Diggers* there is a story of not just the military achievements but also the family background, the difficulty of returning to civilian life, the sadness that sometimes met the men as they returned to unemployment and broken relationships.

Of course, not every serviceman or woman returned to troubled times. Many came back to Hill End and picked up life as they had left it, supporting their families, making a contribution to their communities and living their lives fully to the end. It is a credit to their resilience, stoicism and character that these men, in particular, who had seen such awful scenes of war, did come home and 'soldiered' on.

The book also provides information on how the war affected this small mining town. The home front, the work of the Red Cross, soldiers' letters home and the coming of peace are all covered. It is a splendid piece of work and the authors are to be congratulated.

As well as the impressive coverage of all aspects of the impact of the "War to end all Wars" on Hill End, the authors have produced a professional and stunning book. The quality and presentation is flawless. In addition, it should be noted that the members of the Hill End & Tambaroora Gathering Group, whose ancestors are the servicemen and women in this book, contributed much to this book, including precious family photographs. This is a shared family effort from the many, many families who have continued, under the guidance of Lorraine Purcell, to honour and remember their ancestors and the *Golden Diggers* of their past.

Helen Wood and Lorraine Purcell have produced a significant contribution to our knowledge and understanding of the lives of First World War men and women who lived in and made their homes in the now historic village of Hill End.

DEAD MEN TALKING

Henry Lawson & Banjo Paterson A two-man show of verse, yarns & song

Australia's two favourite poets, Henry Lawson and A.B. 'Banjo' Paterson are touring the mid-west region in August - and will be appearing in Hill End at the Royal Hall on Monday 3rd August at 7pm - a welcome return to their old stamping grounds.

Henry Lawson and Banjo Paterson left extraordinary legacies to Australia and they should never be forgotten. As the world increasingly succumbs to the never-ending and somewhat inevitable pressure of 'one world culture' it is vital that small nations like Australia fight back to show their uniqueness. Our national identity was born in the bush and is one of feistiness and determination where pioneers battled with bushfires, floods, droughts, insect plagues and, quite often, authority and the banks. They also fought loneliness and despair but somehow-or-other came out the other side to build this great nation.

Lawson and Paterson emerged at a time when we needed masterful storytellers who would talk to us in our own language and at our own level. They both took the old bush stories and songs and gave them back to us in a colloquial literary catalogue that bridged the gap between bush and city. They gave us a unique voice that still rings true blue today.

Dead Men Talking is a 90 minute stage musical scripted and featuring **Max Cullen** and **Warren Fahey**.

The lively one act show finds the two legendary literary figures having a casual drink at the Leviticus Bar & Grill, Heaven's Gate, and yarning about their legacies.

Slightly cantankerous, yet grateful of their old friendship, Henry Lawson (Max Cullen) and A. B. 'Banjo' Paterson (Warren Fahey) discuss each other's lives including their famous 'War of Words' in The Bulletin. They recite poems, sing songs and generally banter - and have a laugh about life's changing circumstance.

Dead Men Talking has hit a solid nostalgic note with audiences who delight in seeing Lawson and Paterson strutting the centre stage and the show, (to use an old showbiz phase), "has been packing them in" across Australia. The veteran actors have committed to perform the show "for the next couple of years".

This is a function in honour of Hannah Maclurcan (nee Phillips) born Tambaroora/Hill End NSW in 1860. In 1898 she wrote and published Mrs Maclurcan's Cookery Book. Hannah moved from Queensland to Sydney and became the owner of the

Wentworth Hotel from 1901-1936. During this time she hosted numerous charity events for children, hospitals, war veterans, the Salvation Army, RSPCA and many more. The cost is \$130 each and Hannah's Long Lunch will consist of six course meal created by Mudgee caterer & food consultant, Rebecca Sutton, inspired by Hannah's recipes and using produce from the region where possible. Wines of the region are also included. Entertainment will be provided by the Henry Bialowas Jazz Trio and Australian Bush Band, Jason and Chloe Roweth. Our activities will be based around the Royal Hall where Daphne from Hill End Family History and the Gathering Group will have family history material on display and where you can meet up with family to explore the town together. We are planning for a Town Tour on Saturday afternoon and a catered dinner & talk fest on Saturday evening. On Sunday we will also be visiting Tambaroora and the Cemeteries there as well. The rest of the time is free to visit the other museums in town, take a Bald Hill mine tour, go gold panning or just wander around and enjoy the ambience, whilst locating the family estates...

We will be arranging for a bus to travel from Central Station to Hill End on the Friday and returning to Sydney on Sunday evening for those who do not have their own transport (can do pickup at Strathfield and along the Great Western Hwy if needed). The coach will drop people at their chosen accommodation in Hill End and will be available during the weekend for transport around town.
